President, KY Board of Architects MESSAGE



Dear Members and Friends,

I greatly appreciate the opportunity to serve as the president of the Board this year. The future is bright for Architects and Certified Interior Designers. This is an incredible time to be working as a design professional in Kentucky, more construction is underway than at any time in the history of our state! The largest hurdle we face is fulfilling the growing needs for our services with high quality professional work. Many firms are constantly looking for professional staff. The numbers in Kentucky show that less than 25% of people licensed to work here reside here. All indicators show that we need more licensed professionals in Kentucky.

Ten years ago, the total number of Architects was dwindling at an alarming pace nationwide. A variety of efforts reversed this trend; we enjoy an increase in licensed Architects by about 20% in the past decade. Now more than 120,000 licensed Architects are in the USA. So how do we continue this trend and expand to meet the growing need for professionals.

"One solution to find more professionals may be to find NAAB accredited university program graduates and look at ways to pull them back into our profession.

The National Council of Architecture Registration Boards (NCARB) is constantly improving the testing process and monitoring candidates' performance on the ARE[®]. To this end, NCARB has rolled out practice exams for the first time this year. The improvement in candidate scores is impressive. This hasn't made the test easier; it made study more straight forward and the type of testing easier to understand. Many other factors are constantly being analyzed; this single effort has had a tremendous positive impact.

One solution to find more professionals may be to find NAAB accredited university program graduates and look at ways to pull them back into our profession. A major area of concern is the lack of diversity in the ranks of licensed Architects here in Kentucky. Women make up less than 12% of our licensees. This is far better than 20 years ago when women made up less than 1% of

licensees in Kentucky, but it isn't keeping pace with women graduating. Women are attending and graduating from accredited architecture programs at almost 50%, yet women are not pursuing careers in Architecture at the same rate as men. They must have been passionate about Architecture to complete a degree; how can we bring them back to the profession?

It is impossible to say how many minorities are in our ranks as almost 16% of licensees have not divulged this information. We do know that at least 82% of licensees in Kentucky are white.

The Board of Architects' staff and I will more actively be searching for Kentucky candidates who may have graduated from a NAAB accredited program but are not pursuing licensure. Should you know someone who is working in a different profession or for any reason isn't pursuing a license please let us know so we can assist them in better understanding the process available. Our goal is to help candidates and licensees fulfill the construction industry needs and better serve the health, safety, and welfare of the public. This will benefit all Kentuckians with a wider variety of gualified professionals working here.

NCARB is actively looking at alternative methods to licensure. There are a few committees charged with exploring different aspects of this. ARE CANDIDATE TIPS

RESCHEDULING FEES

NCARB has implemented a new policy for <u>Architect Registration Examination[®] (ARE[®]) rescheduling</u> <u>fees</u>. The new policy began August 1, 2023:



*The first time a candidate reschedules a previously scheduled exam appointment, it will be free

*The second reschedule of the same appointment will cost \$50

*The third and all subsequent reschedules of the same appointment will cost \$100

DOCUMENTING EXPERIENCE

Experience Settings – An ARE[®] candidate's experience reports will fall under one of two experience settings: setting A or setting O. These settings separate your experience into two categories:

• A: Work performed for an architecture firm.

• O: Experiences that can be performed outside an architecture firm. They serve to define the type of organization, the work performed, and who verifies the experience.

COMPETENCE AS RELATED TO ARE®

Definition of Competence as Related to the ARE[®], to protect the health, safety, and welfare of the public, a newly licensed architect practicing independently must demonstrate the competence to be responsible for a project from its inception through completion. This includes, but is not limited to, the ability to:

*Apply architectural business practices

*Evaluate legal, ethical, and contractual standards

- *Establish and coordinate project team activities
- *Establish programmatic and regulatory requirements
- *Provide design alternatives
- *Evaluate and incorporate appropriate materials and building systems
- *Provide and coordinate project documentation for a building and site
- *Provide construction phase services
- *Assess the project during all phases
- *Address environmental sustainability, resiliency, and adaptation throughout project design

Is continuing education required for architects in Kentucky? YES!



Twelve (12) Continuing Education Hours (CEH) are required as a condition for the annual license renewal.

The requirement of CEHs for

the annual renewal shall be acquired during the period beginning January 1 and ending December 31 of the previous calendar year. A minimum of 12 CEH shall consist of structured educational activities on relevant topics addressing health, safety, and welfare subjects as referenced in 201 KAR 19:087, Section 1(3).

NCARB SANCTIONS SIX ARE CANDIDATES



The National Council of Architectural Registration Boards (NCARB) has issued sanctions for six candidates who violated the Architect Registration Examination_® (ARE[®]) Candidate Agreement ranging from copying and sharing exam questions to, in some cases, attempting to

sell exam questions online. Each case was reviewed independently by NCARB's Professional Conduct Committee. Final disciplinary actions were made by NCARB's Board of Directors at their June 2023 meeting. The candidates received public reprimand, their exam scores have been invalidated for any division taken that was found to have violated Category 1 and/or Category 4. Each candidate has had their testing authorization suspended for a period ranging from 5 years to 12 years from their last testing event. Each candidate is required to complete ethics education ranging from 6 to 10 hours within the next 12 months. Candidates found to have violated Category 4 are also not eligible for the NCARB Certificate for a period of no less than 5 years beginning after they receive a valid license. NCARB's UPDATED GOVERNANCE STRUCTURE

NCARB's Diversity Collaborative and Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEI) Committee, and feedback from NCARB's membership proposed changes to NCARB's leadership structure to ensure that their leadership represents the diversity of their constituents, as well as reducing the time required to join NCARB leadership.



According to NCARB's website, the new changes reduced the officers to a total of four: president, vice president, secretary/ treasurer and immediate past president. The membership voted to merge the secretary and treasurer officer positions, eliminate the second vice president position, and add two at-large director positions. This new structure shortens the time required to move into Board leadership and expand the pool of eligible candidates for director positions.

Candidates for the new at-large director positions qualify by either serving for two years on a licensing board or two years on one of NCARB's <u>Board-appointed volunteer</u> efforts. This provides an opportunity to serve on NCARB's Board of Directors to a larger, more diverse group of people, including non-architect members and board executives from NCARB Member Boards as well as architects who have not yet served on a Member Board. The new governance will begin with elections to NCARB's FY25 Board of Directors in June 2024

The Professional Difference Between "Interior Designer" and "Interior Decorator"

Many people use the terms "interior design" and "interior decorating" interchangeably, but these professions differ in critical ways. Interior design is the art and science of understanding people's behavior to create functional spaces within a building. Decoration is the furnishing or adorning of a space with fashionable or beautiful things. In short, interior designers may decorate, but decorators do not design.

Interior designers apply creative and technical solutions within a structure that are functional, attractive and beneficial to the occupants' quality of life and culture. Designs respond to and coordinate with the building shell and acknowledge the physical location and social context of the project. Designs must adhere to code and regulatory requirements and encourage the principles of environmental sustainability.

The interior design process follows a systematic and coordinated methodology including research, analysis and integration of knowledge into the creative process to satisfy the client's needs and resources. U.S. states and Canadian provinces have passed laws requiring interior designers to be licensed or registered and to document their formal education and training. Many states and provinces also specifically require all practicing interior designers to earn the NCIDQ Certification to demonstrate their experience and qualifications. Unlocking Continuing Education: Benefits of CAAK A Vital Resource for Kentucky Architects

As a practicing architect dedicated to advancing our profession, I write to you today with a testament to positive influences that the Code Administrators Association of Kentucky (CAAK) has had on my career. I am delighted to share my experience as a member of CAAK since 2009, and how it has significantly enriched my journey.

Throughout my professional career, CAAK has been instrumental in enhancing my expertise through its diverse range of educational opportunities. These programs obviously meet our state board's minimum continuing education (CE) requirements. However, in my opinion, CAAK has further offered me a crucial conduit to maintain and advance my knowledge and skills specific to safeguarding public health, safety, and welfare (HSW). *i.e.* <u>201 KAR 19:087</u> (3)

The 2022 Analysis of Practice (AOP) study conducted by NCARB underscored the imperative to enhance HSW education. This resonates with CAAK's core mission, making it an invaluable resource for architects.
